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As usual, we are happy with counts a month or so on either side of these dates and you are *encouraged to count any sudden and significant influx that occurs at any time of the year*

International Waterbird Census, Zimbabwe 2020 Ian Riddell

55 sites were counted in 2020, 54 in summer and 20 in winter. Of these, 19 were counted in both seasons, with 35 only counted in summer and 1 in the winter season. Winter counts were no doubt affected by Covid-19 restrictions (Table 1). The International Waterbird Census preferred count days were in the middle of January and July but our counts ranged a month either side of these dates, though only Mandavu Dam was counted in November 2019. Site counts in more than a single month per season can be seen in Table 1 and all these data including recounts are shown in this report.

In January, Nswatugi, Madingazulu and Whitewaters dams (Matopos) were dry. In July, Madingazulu, Maleme, Mesilume, Nswatugi, Sandy Spruit and Whitewaters dams (all Matopos) were dry. Our Ramsar sites coverage is shown in Table 1. Chivero Bird Sanctuary (as part of Lake Chivero) and Monavale vlei were covered in January.

Participants are encouraged to count any sudden and significant influx that occurs at any time of the year.

Coverage of our wetland sites relies on the voluntary services of our members and their often limited resources so grateful thanks are due to those who participated, 50 in the wet and 12 in the dry season, plus those simply listed as BLZ. A big thankyou to those individuals who did extensive counts in Hwange and other sites.

12 652 birds of 150 species were recorded, this total number including 1 unidentified raptor and 7 unidentified waders; this total includes estimates and recounted sites (Table 2). A summary of most species is given below though single site records (1 record for the year) are only listed in Table 2.

Anseriformes (Anatidae): ducks and geese

White-faced Duck Dendrocygna viduata

- Summer: Ranged from 2-229 (Av. 34.2); Chinga Pan had 51, Lanark Farm 80, followed by highs of 173 at Devon Dam and 229 at Mazvikadei Dam.
- Winter: a range from 2-110, the high count from Suni Pan. Karima weir had 99 birds. Mandavu had 49 birds in May and 5 in June.

White-backed Duck Thalassornis leuconotus

Summer: counts were 10, 15, 40 & 157. The high count came from Clifton farm dam in January. Winter: not recorded.

Egyptian Goose Alopochen aegyptiaca

- Summer: Generally ranged from 1-15 birds (Av. 5.3, 27 sites), and then numbers rose with 52 at Scotts Pan, 58 at Ngamo Pans, and a high of 74 at Mandavu Dam in November and 80 in January.
- Winter: ranged from 2-63 birds (Av. 28.8). Low counts were from Mbonisa Weir (2) and Chinga Pan (5), and Mpopoma Dam had 61 birds. Mandavu was counted in May (31), June (63), and July (7).

Spur-winged Goose Plectropterus gambensis

Summer: Found in low numbers from 1-6 at 9 sites. Winter: 1 each at Chinga & Suni pans.

African Comb Duck *Sarkidiornis melanotos*

Summer: From 1-9 at 13 sites, the 9 at Mtsheleli Dam.

Winter: not recorded.

African Pygmy-goose Nettapus auritus

Summer: Low numbers of 2-11 (Av. 6.3, 6 sites) were far exceeded by 110 at Clifton farm dam. Winter: not recorded.

Southern Pochard Netta erythrophthalma

Summer: Only found at Clifton (2) and Kent Estate dams (7). Winter: not recorded.

Hottentot Teal Spatula hottentota

Summer: Numbers were low with 1-6 at 7 sites. Winter: not recorded.

African Black Duck Anas sparsa

Summer: 2 each at Knoll Farm Dam and Rakodzi Farm Dam (this updates the Jan. count data). Winter: not recorded.

Yellow-billed Duck Anas undulata

Summer: a single at Ballantyne Park South on 15 January.

Cape Teal Anas capensis

Summer: recorded only at David Whitehead Ponds, Kadoma Textiles Dye Ponds and Mandavu Dam (November) with 2 at each site.

Red-billed Teal Anas erythrorhyncha

Summer: 2-39 birds (Av. 12.9) at 23 sites plus higher counts of 57 at Scotts Pan and 81 at Shumba pumped pan, Hwange.

Winter: numbers from 6-19 (Av. 11), 12 were at Dwarf Goose Pan and 19 at Karima weir.

Podicipediformes (Podicipedidae) grebes

Little Grebe Tachybaptus ruficollis

Summer: Counts were very low, from 1-3 at 8 sites, then 40 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: counts were poor with 1 at Camp Hwange and 2 at Mpopoma Dam.

Cuculiformes (Cuculidae) coucals

Senegal Coucal Centropus senegalensis Summer: from 1-3 at 6 sites. Winter: not recorded.

Diderick Cuckoo Chrysococcyx caprius

Summer: singles at 3 sites and 3 at Marlborough Vlei.

Black Coucal Centropus grillii

Summer: from 1-4 at 4 sites, the largest number from Marlborough Vlei.

Gruiformes (Heliornithidae-Gruidae) finfoots, flufftails, rails, crakes, cranes

African Finfoot Podica senegalensis Summer: 4 at Hippo Pools camp.

Red-chested Flufftail Sarothrura rufa Summer: 1 at Monavale Vlei and 5 at Marlborough Vlei.

African Crake Crecopsis egregia

Summer: 1 at Marlborough vlei and 4 at Monavale Vlei.

Spotted Crake Porzana porzana

Summer: 2 at David Whitehead Ponds on 20 January warrant special mention.

Black Crake Zapornia flavirostra

Summer: From 1-10 (Av. 4) at 11 sites, then 26 at Mazvikadei Dam. Winter: not recorded.

African Purple Swamphen Porphyrio madagascariensis

Summer: From 1-3 at 4 sites, plus 14 at Clifton farm dam.

Winter: not recorded.

Allen's Gallinule Porphyrio alleni

Summer: 2 at Mandalay Dam and 4 at Marlborough Vlei.

Common Moorhen Gallinula chloropus

Summer: Ranged from 1-10 (Av. 4.5, 10 sites) with higher counts of 23 (Marlborough Vlei) and 27 (Clifton farm dam). Winter: 1 from Karima weir.

Lesser Moorhen Gallinula angulata

Summer: 1 at Biri Dam Fishing Site and 2 at Clifton farm dam.

Winter: not recorded.

Grey Crowned Crane Balearica regulorum

Summer: all recorded from Hwange, with 1 at Somavundhla Pan, 2 each at Shumba pumped pan, 'Back Pan' and Reedbuck Vlei, 4 at Camp Hwange, and 10 at Makalolo Pan.

Winter: 2 at Camp Hwange.

Ciconiiformes (Ciconiidae) storks

Marabou Stork Leptoptilos crumenifer

Summer: 1 at Dwarf Goose Pan, 5 at Mandavu Dam and 83 at Kent Estate dams. Note that the January report had 3 at Kent Estate, which was an error, though Table 2 reflected the correct number.



Yellow-billed Stork Mycteria ibis

Summer: 1-3 at 3 sites, 15 at Mandavu Dam in November & 29 there in January.

Winter: 1 at Mbonisa Weir, 6 at Mandavu in May, 7 in June and 8 in July, then 41 at Suni Pan & 44 at Chinga Pan.

African Openbill Anastomus lamelligerus

Summer: 1 at Shumba pumped pan, 13 at Mazvikadei Dam, 20 at Mandavu Dam, 53 at Chinga Pan, 5 at Kent Estate dams and 116 at Suni Pan.

Winter: 4 at Chinga Pan & 19 at Suni Pan.

Abdim's Stork Ciconia abdimii

Summer: 3-30 (Av. 15.3) at 6 sites, plus 70 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary and 153 at Crowborough Farm.

Woolly-necked Stork Ciconia microscelis

Summer: 12 at Camp Hwange and 23 at Shumba pumped pan.

Winter: 1 at Suni Pan.

White Stork *Ciconia ciconia*

Summer: 33 at Kent Estate dams.

Saddle-billed Stork Ephippiorhynchus senegalensis

- Summer: 2 each at Dwarf Goose Pan and Mandavu Dam.
- Winter: 2 each at Mandavu Dam, Mpopoma Dam and Suni Pan.

Pelecaniformes (Threskiornithidae-Pelecanidae) ibises, spoonbills, herons, Hamerkop, pelicans

African Spoonbill Platalea alba

- Summer: 1-12 (Av. 4.1) at 7 sites13 at Mandavu Dam in November and 26 in January.
- Winter: 1 at Suni Pan and 15 at Chinga Pan. Mandavu Dam had 9 in May, 8 in June and 4 in July.

African Sacred Ibis Threskiornis aethiopicus

- Summer: ranged from 1-17 (Av. 5.4) at 12 sites, Mandavu Dam having 17 in November & 2 in January, with a high of 225 from Crowborough Farm.
- Winter: 3 at Suni Pan & 35 at Chinga Pan. Mandavu, with 3 counts (May-July), showed no appreciable change in numbers with 2-3 birds.

Glossy Ibis Plegadis falcinellus

Summer: 2-25 (Av. 9.9) at 7 sites, Mandavu Dam having 4 in November & 16 in January, plus 48 at Mazvikadei Dam.

Winter: 1 at Mandavu Dam.

Black-crowned Night-heron Nycticorax

Summer: 2 at Suni Pan and 3 at Chinga Pan.

Green-backed Heron Butorides striata

Summer: From 1-3 birds at 5 sites, then 8 from Hippo Pools camp.

Winter: 1 each at Suni & Chinga pans.

Squacco Heron Ardeola ralloides

Summer: 2-8 (Av. 4.4) from 8 sites, plus 49 from Mazvikadei Dam.

Winter: 2 at Suni Pan.

Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis

Summer: Numbers ranged from 1-130 (Av. 30.1, 14 sites) followed by 164 at Little Devon Dam, 320 at Crowborough Farm and 478 at Mazvikadei Dam.

Winter: 1 at Mpopoma Dam and 2 at Mandavu Dam.

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

Summer: from 1-8 (Av. 2.3) at 12 sites, then 18 at Mandavu Dam in November & 21 in January, plus a high 70 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: apart from singles at Mpopoma Dam & Shumba pumped pan, ranged from 12-21 at 3 other sites. Three counts at Mandavu in May-July had 12-18 birds.

Black-headed Heron Ardea melanocephala

Summer: 1-8 (Av. 2.4) from 13 sites, plus 10 from David Whitehead Ponds and 30 from Kadoma Textiles Dye Ponds.

Winter: 1 each at Mandavu Dam and Suni Pan.

Goliath Heron Ardea goliath

Summer: 1 at Mandavu Dam.

Winter: 1 each at Mandavu, Chinga & Suni pans.

Purple Heron Ardea purpurea

Summer: From 1-3 birds at 5 sites, then 9 at Clifton farm dam and 25 at Mazvikadei Dam. Winter: not recorded.

Great Egret Ardea alba

- Summer: 1-8 (Av. 3.9) at 7 sites, Mandavu Dam having 5 in November & 3 in January, 12 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary, 1 at Clifton farm dam and 22 at Mazvikadei Dam.
- Winter: 1 at Chinga Pan & 8 at Suni Pan; Mandavu (3 counts, May-July) had 2-8 birds.

Yellow-billed Egret Ardea brachyrhyncha

Summer: 1 at Somavundhla Pan, 27 at Mazvikadei Dam, 32 at Chinga Pan and 49 at Suni Pan.

Winter: not recorded.

Black Heron Egretta ardesiaca

Summer: 1-2 at 5 sites, then 75 at Mazvikadei Dam. Winter: not recorded.

Little Egret Egretta garzetta

Summer: from 1-8 (Av. 3.9, 9 sites), Mandavu Dam having 5 in November & 8 in January, 37 at Mazvikadei Dam and 46 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: 5 at Mandavu Dam.

Hamerkop Scopus umbretta

Summer: ranged from 1-7 (Av. 2.3), the 7 from Hippo Pools camp. Winter: from 1-2 at five sites.

Suliformes (Phalacrocoracidae-Anhingidae) cormorants and darters

Reed Cormorant Microcarbo africanus

Summer: from 2-40 (Av. 12.3, 16 sites), then 186 at Mazvikadei Dam.

Winter: not recorded.



White-breasted Cormorant *Phalacrocorax lucidus* Summer: from 1-11 at 2 sites, then 300 at Lake

- Chivero Bird Sanctuary.
- Winter: Mandavu only with 2-4 in May-July (3 counts).

African Darter Anhinga rufa

- Summer: 2 each from 3 sites (Chinga Pan, Suni Pan and Mandavu Dam (November)), then 5 at Mazvikadei Dam being the only record from the plateau.
- Winter: Mandavu only with 4 in May and 3 in June.

Charadriiformes: thick-knees, avocets & stilts, plovers, jacanas, sandpipers & snipes, coursers, pratincoles, gulls, terns & skimmers

Water Thick-knee Burhinus vermiculatus

- Summer: 3-12 from 5 sites, the 12 from Hippo Pools camp.
- Winter: singles in May & June at 2 at Masuma Dam/Pan.

Pied Avocet Recurvirostra avosetta

Summer: Only 1 at Mandavu Dam in November and 10 at Pasi Dam in January.

Winter: not recorded.

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus himantopus

- Summer: 1-24 (Av. 9.3) from 15 sites, 55 at Mazvikadei Dam, and from Mandavu Dam, 57 in November and a high of 174 in January.
- Winter: the 3 Mandavu counts (May-July) had 21, 15 & 14 birds.

Kittlitz's Plover Charadrius pecuarius

Summer: 1-11 (Av. 3.8) at 13 sites, 17 at Mazvikadei Dam and 46 at Kent Estate dams.

Winter: At Mandavu Dam only with 3-8 (May-July, 3 counts).

Three-banded Plover Charadrius tricollaris

- Summer: 1-10 (Av. 3.9) from 11 sites, then Mandavu Dam had 21 in November and 13 in January.
- Winter: 2-11 (Av. 5.6), from 3 sites. Mandavu Dam (May-July, 3 counts) had 3-11 birds.

Blacksmith Lapwing Vanellus armatus

- Summer: 27 sites had 1-11 birds (Av. 4.4) (Mandavu 9 in November), 8 sites had 16-37 (Mandavu 16 in January), Av. 25.4, then 73 at Ngamo Pans and 100 at Mazvikadei Dam.
- Winter: ranged from 1-33 (Av. 11.1). Higher numbers were 20 at Chinga Pan and 26-33 at Mandavu Dam (May-July, 3 counts).

Crowned Lapwing Vanellus coronatus

Summer: 1 at Marlborough Vlei, 2 at Mandalay Dam, 6 at Ngamo Pans and 9 at 'Back Pan'. Winter: 2 at Camp Hwange.

African Wattled Lapwing Vanellus senegallus

Summer: 1-6 (Av. 3.2) at 8 sites, and 19-32 (Av. 26.5) at 4 sites, the 32 from Lanark Farm. Winter: 1 at Mpopoma Dam and 6 at Chinga Pan.

African Jacana Actophilornis africanus

- Summer: Numbers ranged from 1-687 (Av. 41.9) at 23 sites. High counts were 98 at Clifton farm dam and a high of 687 at Mazvikadei Dam. These figures correct the January report.
- Winter: 1-8 at 5 sites, Mandavu (May-July, 3 counts) with 1-2 birds.

Ruff Philomachus pugnax

Summer: from 5-13 (Av. 9.6) at 7 sites (Mandavu 7 in January), 21 at Kent Estate dams and 47 at Mandavu Dam in November.

Winter: 1 at Mandavu Dam in May.

Little Stint Calidris minuta

Summer: 1 at Mandavu Dam (January) & Kent Estate dams, 5 at Mandavu Dam (November) and 26 at David Whitehead Ponds.

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

Summer: Low numbers with 1-4 at 7 sites.

Common Greenshank *Tringa nebularia* Summer: 1-4 at 9 sites.

Winter: Mandavu Dam had 1 each in May & June.

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

Summer: 1-15 (Av. 6.2) at 18 sites, Mandavu with 3 in November & 6 in January, followed by 52 at Mazvikadei Dam.

Winter: 4 at Mandavu Dam in July.

Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

Summer: low counts of 2-3 at 5 sites, Mandavu with 2 in November & 3 in January.

Winter: 1 at Shumba Pans in July.

African Skimmer Rynchops flavirostris

Summer: only found at Mandavu Dam with 2 in November and 13 in January.

Winter: Mandavu Dam - 1 (May), 7 (June) & 6 (July).

Grey-headed Gull Larus cirrocephalus

Summer: 1 at Mandavu Dam, 6 at Mazvikadei Dam and 50 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: 1 at Mandavu Dam in July.

Whiskered Tern *Chlidonias hybrida* Winter: 3 at Mandavu Dam in May.

White-winged Tern Chlidonias leucopterus

Summer: 2 at Clifton farm dam, 29 at Mandavu in November & 27 in January, and 300 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: not recorded.

Strigiformes (Strigidae) owls

Marsh Owl Asio capensis

Summer: 1 at Monavale Vlei and 4 at Marlborough vlei. Winter: not recorded.

Accipitriformes (Pandionidae-Accipitridae) osprey, kites, hawks, eagles

Osprey Pandion haliaetus

Summer: Singles at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary, Mandavu Dam and Rakodzi Farm Dam, and 2 at Mazvikadei Dam. Winter: not recorded.

Black-shouldered Kite Elanus caeruleus

Summer: Singles at Ballantyne Park South, Crowborough Farm, David Whitehead Ponds and Devon Dam. Winter: not recorded. Long-crested Eagle Lophaetus occipitalis

Summer: 1 each at Mazvikadei Dam and Monavale Vlei.

Winter: not recorded.

African Fish-eagle Haliaeetus vocifer

Summer: 1-3 at 15 sites, 8 at Mazvikadei Dam and 20 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: 1-3 at 6 sites. Mandavu Dam had 1-2 birds in 3 counts in May-July.

Yellow-billed Kite *Milvus aegyptius* Summer: 1-3 at 5 sites and 7 at Scotts Pan.

Coraciiformes (Meropidae-Alcedinidae) bee-eaters, kingfishers

White-fronted Bee-eater Merops bullockoides

Summer: 2 at Mbonisa Weir and 4 each at David Whitehead Ponds and Devon Dam.

Winter: 2 at Chinga Pan and 3 at Mbonisa Weir.

Southern Carmine Bee-eater *Merops nubicoides* Summer: 3 at Makalolo Pan, 7 at 'Back Pan' and 8 at Scotts Pan.

European Bee-eater Merops apiaster

Summer: 1-6 at 5 sites, 14 at Chinga Pan, 20 at Monavale Vlei and 66 at Country Club Golf course.

Little Bee-eater Merops pusillus

Summer: 1-6 (Av. 3) at 5 sites. The January count had 4 sites, which was an error. Winter: 1 at Mbonisa Weir.

Malachite Kingfisher Corythornis cristatus

Summer: 1-2 at 4 sites with a high 14 at Mazvikadei Dam. This corrects errors in the January count. Winter: 1 at Mandavu Dam.

Half-collared Kingfisher Alcedo semitorquata

Summer: 1 at Hippo Pools camp. Winter: 2 at Hippo Pools camp.

Giant Kingfisher Megaceryle maxima

Summer: 1-4 (Av. 1.9) at 11 sites. Winter: not recorded.

Pied Kingfisher Cervle rudis

Lanner Falcon Falco biarmicus

Summer: 1-8 birds (Av. 3.3), then 40 at Mazvikadei Dam.

Winter: 1-5 birds (Av. 3) at 5 sites. Mandavu Dam (3 counts May-July) had 4, 3 & 5.

Summer: 1 at Marlborough Vlei and 2 at Kent

Woodland Kingfisher Halcyon senegalensis Summer: 2 each at Chinga Pan and Suni Pan.

Falconiformes (Falconidae) falcons

Amur Falcon Falco amurensis

Summer: Only 1 each at David Whitehead Ponds and Kent Estate dams.

Cisticolas and allies (Cisticolidae) Red-faced Cisticola Cisticola erythrops

Summer: 1-5 at 5 sites, the high count from Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary.

Winter: not recorded.

Rattling Cisticola Cisticola chiniana

Summer: Singles at Marlborough Vlei and Monavale Vlei.

Winter: not recorded.

Croaking Cisticola Cisticola natalensis Summer: 1-2 at 3 sites and 6 at Monavale Vlei. Winter: not recorded.

Zitting Cisticola Cisticola juncidis

Summer: 1-3 at 8 sites. Winter: not recorded.

Tawny-flanked Prinia Prinia subflava Summer: Possibly undercounted, 2-4 at 4 sites. Winter: not recorded.

Reed-warblers (Acrocephalidae)

Dark-capped Yellow Warbler Iduna natalensis Summer: 1 at Monavale Vlei and 3 at Marlborough Vlei.

African Reed-warbler Acrocephalus baeticatus

Summer: 2-3 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary, Marlborough Vlei and Monavale Vlei.

Lesser Swamp-warbler Acrocephalus *aracilirostris* Summer: 1-6 at 5 sites, then 15 at Marlborough Vlei. Winter: not recorded.

Grasshopper-warblers and Grassbirds (Locustellidae)

Little Rush-warbler Bradypterus baboecala

Summer: 2 & 3 at Monavale Vlei & Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary, then 9 at Marlborough Vlei.

Winter: not recorded.

Swallows and Martins (Hirundinidae)

Grey-rumped Swallow Pseudhirundo griseopyga Summer: 3 at Monavale Vlei and 7 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary. Winter: not recorded.

Red-breasted Swallow Cecropis semirufa

Summer: 2 at Crowborough Farm and 4 at David Whitehead Ponds.

White-throated Swallow Hirundo albigularis

Summer: 1 at Kent Estate dams and 2 at Marlborough Vlei.

Wire-tailed Swallow Hirundo smithii

Summer: 4 each at Country Club Golf course and Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary. Winter: not recorded.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

Summer: 6 at Monavale Vlei, 10 at Kent Estate dams and 15 at Crowborough Farm.

Old World Flycatchers and Chats (Muscicapidae)

African Stonechat *Saxicola torquatus*

Summer: 2 at Gletwyn Dam. Winter: 3 at Marlborough Vlei.

Weavers (Ploceidae)

Thick-billed Weaver Amblyospiza albifrons

Summer: 2 at Gletwyn Dam, 8 at Monavale Vlei and 10 at Mazvikadei Ponds. Winter: not recorded.

Red-billed Quelea Quelea quelea

Summer: Only a single at Kent Estate dams and 40 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary. Winter: not recorded.

Southern Red Bishop Euplectes orix

The counts of low numbers in the Euplectes spp. below probably reflect the visible males, with variable effort to count females.

Summer: Most counts from 2-25, though some under counting is likely, especially of females. Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary had 60 and Monavale Vlei had 65.

Winter: not recorded.

Red-collared Widowbird Euplectes ardens

Summer: 3-7 then 38 at Monavale Vlei. Winter: not recorded.

Winter: not recorded.

Yellow Bishop Euplectes capensis

Summer: Singles at Country Club Golf course and David Whitehead Ponds, then 10 at Monavale Vlei.

Common Waxbill Estrilda astrild

Summer: 4-30 (Av. 14) at 4 sites with the high count of 30 from Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary. Winter: not recorded.

Orange-breasted Waxbill Amandava subflava

Summer: 4 at Mandalay Dam, 15 at Marlborough Vlei, 18 at Monavale Vlei and 200 at Lake Chivero Bird Sanctuary. Winter: not recorded.

Yellow-mantled Widowbird Euplectes macroura

Summer: 1 at Kent Estate dams and 24 at Monavale Vlei.

Winter: not recorded.

White-winged Widowbird Euplectes albonotatus

Summer: This season showed an incursion into Harare. 1 at Marlborough Vlei and 4 at Monavale Vlei.

Winter: not recorded.

Mashonaland

Bird outings around and about Harare

Bally Vaughan, Sunday 27th September 2020

Had the birds, as we had, been warned of the heat and heaviness of the day or were they driven away by the roars of the lions? Whatever the case, birding was really hard work despite guiding from Willem to all the most promising habitats of the sanctuary. Fortunately, we had eyes and ears keener than mine or the six of us wouldn't have reached even 50 species at this super venue.

Our first stage was a stroll round the dam and woodland near the cages of mostly exotic species of animals and birds. European Beeeaters could be heard by some high above us and the frenetic activity of a colony of Village Weavers was evident but their nests threatened by a marauding Senegal Coucal. A Whitenecked Raven, attracted by the food supplied for the animals, was in the Bushpig's pen with a African Jacana, Levaillant's Cattle Egret. Little Rush-warbler and Lesser Cisticola, Swamp-warbler were active in the reedbed and Black-headed Oriole and Klaas's Cuckoo called from woodland. The only bird on the dwala behind us seemed to be a Lazy Cisticola.

We next drove down to the riverine section where we had a pleasant walk through miombo

woodland, up one side and down the other of the dry gorge. Wonderful trees but almost no birds. On the way we came across a Lizard Buzzard foraging for nesting material and when we scanned an area of savanna, Patrick spotted a Greater Honeyguide, Amethyst Sunbird and a Black Cuckooshrike in a tall msasa. Striped Pipit could be heard in the distance. In the course of our walk back to the vehicles the same eagle eyes noticed a Little Sparrowhawk on its nest.

Our last port of call was the dam on Bally Vaughan farm on the other side of the Shamva Road. There was very little water left from the irrigating of the surrounding wheat fields but just enough to interest Reed Cormorant, Great Egret and Yellow-billed Egret, Egyptian Goose and African Sacred Ibis.

The small woodland patch nearby offered up Terrestrial Brownbuls, Arrow-marked Babblers and boatloads of African Reed-warblers. With the temperature soaring we headed back to the sanctuary to tally up: 75 in total. All in all a very enjoyable morning was had in beautiful surrounds, even if the birding was a bit sparse!

Lovebirds get their name from the strong bond which forms between a male and female. Pairs of lovebirds spend much of their time close together, regularly preening each other's feathers. They are in fact monogamous (they have only one mate during a breeding season, or throughout the breeding life of a pair).

In Zimbabwe, Lilian's lovebirds occur in the Middle Zambezi below the escarpment from the Angwa and Hunyani Rivers westwards to Binga and Msuna although much suitable habitat has been lost within the Kariba Basin. They are often found in woodlands of mopane trees but also inhabit Acacia woodlands on flood plains, forest bordering rivers and lakes, and in fig trees.

> This brightly coloured lovebird has a gregarious nature and is usually observed in small groups, although sometimes up to 100 may gather. These large flocks only occur during winter, however, when the birds are not breeding.

It was a great pity that more members and friends did not take advantage of the opportunity to explore this extensive game park offered by Dave Hasluck. The eight of us were not far from Harare, in the open air, masked and distanced as desired, untroubled by roadblocks and treated to a feast of 116 species of birds in a delightful area of woodland and dams.

A guestimate of the gathering of White-faced Ducks was 1,500. What a sight when they all took off! Plenty of Egyptian Goose, a dozen Spur-winged Goose, 11 African Spoonbill, Grey Squacco and Green-backed Heron and a pair of African Black Duck plus a Pied Kingfisher and 4 Malachite Kingfisher, Common Sandpiper and Wood Sandpiper, Three-banded Plover, Little Egret and Great Egret, African Jacana and a Common Greenshank completed the dam count. Nearby were Dark-capped Yellow Warbler, Lesser Swamp-warbler African Reed-warbler and Red-faced Cisticola all singing lustily. The mixed miombo and acacia woodland was alive with birds; Golden-tailed Woodpecker and Cardinal Woodpecker, Black Cuckooshrike, Orange-breasted Bush-shrike and Grey-headed Bush-shrike, Diderick Cuckoo and Levaillant's Cuckoo, Red-headed Weaver, Village Weaver and Southern Masked-weaver and many others. Recent arrivals or Covid escapees were Barn Swallow, a Common Swift, European Bee-eater and a Garden Warbler. One eagle-eyed observer spotted a nest in an acacia with a Lizard Buzzard hunkered down on it. Other raptors were a Black-chested Snake-eagle and an African Harrier-hawk.

Mashonaland East

Mashonaland East Natural History Society MARONDERA September/October 2020 Newsletter

The early rains and warmer weather has brought about a lot more bird activity and with the lifting of lockdown restrictions at the Trust the residents have been able to enjoy getting out into the districts and look for birds.

The news on the Helmeted Guineafowl in the Trust is not too good. The eggs Louis Jacobs was trying to incubate were infertile and obviously didn't hatch. A further 24 eggs were laid in Louis' garden and he put 12 of them in the incubator. At the time of writing it is day 15 since incubation started. Regrettably, the female is still not sitting on the other 12 eggs. Only 4 of the 9 juvenile Guineafowl received a few months ago have survived. One fatality was to drowning in a water container. The cause of the second fatality is not known, while the remaining 3 fatalities were caused by domestic cats. Thank you Louis for your time and effort in trying to raise the Guineafowl. Please don't give up.

A few weeks ago, Malcolm Moodie posted a picture of a Southern Black Flycatcher. It is nice to see these birds back in the Trust. Phyllis van Reenen was very blessed to find and photograph a Spotted Creeper in the Kushinga Phikelela area. Some of our members have been trying to see one of these birds for a while now but sadly without success. Phyllis' sighting prompted a group of us to spend a morning in the Kushinga Phikelela dam area specifically looking for the Creeper. We had a lovely morning, accepted our defeat and vowed to try again. We did record 39 different species that morning. Stuart Wood came out all the way from Harare to join us, which was a noble effort.

We enjoyed a morning outing to Rakodze where we recorded 49 different species. Thanks to Jen Mitchell for allowing us to wander around her garden and also for the use of her house for our morning tea and luncheon.

Sue saw a Senegal Coucal in our garden and later I had a very close up view of it hiding in our neighbour's hedge.

Sue and I went to Seldomseen in the Vumba for a couple of nights. This was a very successful outing for us and without the services of Bhulawezi, the resident guide, I am sure we would have returned home disappointed. The more notable sightings were of the Swynnerton's Robin (3 different occasions), White-starred Robin, Black-fronted Bush-shrike, Red-faced Crimsonwing, White-tailed Crested Flycatcher, Livingstone's Turaco, Yellow-bellied Waxbill, Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird, Lemon Dove and the Chirinda Apalis. We also saw several Samango monkeys and a Sun squirrel. We heard the African Emerald Cuckoo calling several times but sadly we were unable to get a sighting.

While up there, we checked on the condition of the National Parks cottages with a view of our members staying there. We also called in at the Blue Forrest Inn to view their menu but sadly they were closed as there was a wedding function taking place. We went to the White Horse Inn to try and dine there but they were hosting a conference so weren't open to the public. The next venue to visit was Tony's Café. I wish he had been closed but admit that the coffee and cakes were delicious.

A few of our MENHS members went to Connemara at the beginning of October to do some birding and partake in the trout fishing competition. Well done to Penny Raynor who won the Ladies prize. I think Penny could easily hold her own competing with the men. Jenny Milne reported that the birders got to see a number of birds but they were all the usual ones, no specials.

I saw an advert for seats available on a threenight birding trip to Rifa with the Mashonaland BirdLife Zimbabwe members. I contacted Geoff Lowe and Sue and was accepted. We thoroughly enjoyed ourselves and our bird count tallied 95 species. In Marondera we had slowly been working up the 20s degree Celsius scale and then when we got to Rifa we found we had skipped the 30s and gone straight into the 40s degrees. My lasting memories of that Rifa trip were the Lilian's Lovebirds, Southern Carmine Bee-eaters, Meyer's Parrots, Meyes's Starlings and large amounts of plastic in the ellie Faith, at the Zimbabwe Hunters' dung. Association Office, was very helpful with payment of relevant fees and issuing a permit for use at the roadblocks. Fortunately we never had to use them.

Sue and I were hoping to go to Mkushi in Zambia to visit our oldest daughter Bridget and her family as soon as the land borders opened. Bridget had said they wanted to take us to witness the bat migration in the Kasanka National Park in November. A few of the people we met at Rifa had previously been there to see the 10 million fruit bats that arrive in Kasanka between October and December each year. The bats fly out of the trees in the morning and arrive back to their roosting place each evening. Quite spectacular.

It is a pleasure to see and hear of so many of the birds returning to the Trust. Jo has reported the African Paradise-flycatchers are regular visitors to her birdbath. Sue also came across 4 of them at the water tanks near the Baxters' cottage on one of her morning walks. I saw a Green Wood-hoopoe coming out of the gable vent above the snooker room and assumed it had a nest there. I have been back a few times to check but haven't seen the bird again. Groundscraper Thrushes are back and Pat Lister is watching some African Hoopoes that are nesting close to his cottage. Pat tells me the eggs have hatched and the youngsters have left their Barbie Ervine has been watching a nest. Kurrichane Thrush nest in her garden and the two babies have just left the nest. I did see the Greater Honeyguide again in the same place near the beehive.

I love it when people call on me to tell me about some bird or the other. The Spotted Eagle-owls are back in Steve's garden and can be seen in the tree they usually roost in. Patch Martin told me that some Verreaux's Eagle-owls are nesting in somebody's workshop in Marondera. I haven't been to see them and I hear the owner was attacked by one of the parents when he tried to help a baby owl that had fallen out the nest. Peter Rawstorne told me that he found an injured Spotted Eagle-owl in his garden. He thinks the owl flew into an overhead power line and injured its wing. He looked after it for a few days and it has since flown off. Well done Peter. An Abdim's Stork has been seen on the Frail Care lawn. Jen Mitchell said she saw the Common Mynas nesting in the roofing of the forecourt of Pick 'n Pay.

I have had the Violet-backed Starlings inspecting my work mowing the bowling green at the Trust. They seem to be chased by the Fork-tailed Drongos, which in turn are chased by the Miombo Blue-eared Starlings. While mowing the green last Friday I heard a most unusual bird call. I suspected it was a raptor. I listened to the call for a while and tried to memorise it. About an hour later, just as I finished mowing, Anton arrived and told me he had heard a Diderick Cuckoo calling in his garden. He imitated the call and it seemed to be the call I had been hearing a bit earlier. Anton said his father called it his rain bird because when his father heard the Diderick Cuckoo calling it would rain within 2 or 3 days. I immediately thought he was confused with the "Piet My Vrou" but he assured me not so. Low and behold it rained that night. Thanks Anton for that lesson.

A couple of members managed to go into Harare recently and visit the Spar bird sanctuary. They thoroughly enjoyed their morning outing. A few other members took part in the game count in the Zambezi Valley and spent a few days at Chitake Spring.

I did visit the Grasslands Research station and met the officer in charge, Accadius Kigere. He has no objection to us going birding there but requested we give him a few days' notice and also liaise with the farm manager.

Our next outing is to the Worswicks' farm in Macheke on Sunday 15 November.

Mashonaland West

Time waits for nobody – here we are at yearend!

Our hot days of September-October have been extreme, the barometer often -9, and the frogs croaking for a month, calling the rain! The bush is lush, refreshing and new growth in different colours, with the birds, insects and bees feeding on the ground and above.

We visit weekly different areas and habitats.

19th September

A hot, hazy day with a visit to Sable farm near Suri Suri dam, the big coffee-shade trees a A juvenile Black-chested Snake-eagle relief. two Black-shouldered Kites, overhead, Hamerkop, two Marabou Storks with a nest in an Albizia tree near the piggery, a calling Lizard Buzzard and African Harrier-hawk. The European Bee-eaters were overhead giving their distinctive call, plus an African Fish-eagle, a resident Purple Heron, a pair of White-backed Ducks, 40+ Cattle Egrets at the piggery. Whitebellied Sunbird, Scarlet-chested Sunbird and Amethyst Sunbirds scouting about the trees, the

White-browed Scrub-robin, a favourite, chirpy with his repertoire. Of course, nesting time for many birds, hence lots of calls.

10th October

A bright sunny day – we drove to Suri Suri, a well-built dam of the 70s. Natal Spurfowl and Swainson's Spurfowl along the dry bush roads, stopping to look at us before disappearing into the thickets. Flappet Lark, Red-capped Lark and Rufous-naped Lark were active along the red tobacco field, two pairs of Crowned Lapwing trotted along the hot ground - with nests somewhere? Three Spotted Thick-knees moved from an open area into short grassland. An African Grey Hornbill called as he flew in his undulating fashion. Diderick Cuckoo and Klaas's Cuckoo called, and an African Barred Owlet from the woodland. At the dam we enjoyed out tea break beside a Combretum and granite of spectacular formations, worn clean and smooth from centuries of flooding; not a noise or soul in sight! On the dam, 2 Threebanded Plovers, 3 Reed Cormorants, 220+

White-faced Ducks, a Little Egret, 10 African Openbills, 116+ Comb Duck, 1 Egyptian Goose – the African Fish-eagle nest was occupied by a standing adult, then the other flew in and both attended to a chick?

17th October

A lovely cool, sunny day, we motored to a dam beyond Gadzema on the Chinhoyi road. We stopped at random: a Black Cuckoo with his mournful call, Golden-breasted Bunting, Lilacbreasted Roller, Natal Spurfowl and Helmeted Guineafowl all happily calling on this fresh morning, fresh after recent rain.

Proceeding to this dam with little water and abundant shoreline, we noted 6 African Wattled Lapwings, 2 Kittlitz's Plovers, a pair of Buffy Pipits and another of African Pipits, 4 Blackwinged Stilts, 3 Collared Pratincoles, a Common Greenshank, 2 Temminck's Coursers. Rattling Cisticola, Croaking Cisticola and Red-faced Cisticola called from the nearby grassland.

7th November

The day already hot at 7 a.m. A new area (-18.443650, 29.814017) called Bentley Plots, across the Umsweswe old low-level bridge – but what a road – a tractor would have been better!

There are still many large woodland trees and large amounts of water behind the weir - a Malachite Kingfisher had found food. The Lesser Striped Swallows are nesting under the old bridge but perch on the railings, so we were able to get good photos. A Levaillant's Cuckoo

with its gun-rattle roll at the end of his call; the Red-chested Cuckoo 'piet my vrou' are loud and clear - are they scouting for nests to parasitise? Orange-breasted **Bush-shrikes** The were plentiful with their repetitive liquid 'poo-poopoo', but such handsome creatures. Nesting time for many birds everywhere. Southern White-crowned Shrikes moving in a group of 5-7, enjoying the new vegetation, the Emeraldspotted Wood-dove always calling in the heat of the day, the Cape Turtle-doves calling earlier. The Lesser Masked-weavers are nesting along the riverbank above deep water.

31st October

Chigwell Estates, halfway between Kadoma & Chegutu on the railway line side. Not far from the main road, a lovely-sized dam on the youthful Suri Suri River; lots of woodland so regular sightings. The Violet-backed Starlings shimmering in their glossy plumage, a lone Wahlberg's Eagle soaring above the canopy, then landing out of sight. An Egyptian Goose family with 7 goslings enjoying the shoreline, a pair of Pied Kingfishers, an African Pied Wagtail, Squacco Heron, Little Egret, 4 African Jacana, Hamerkop, Giant Kingfisher, Marsh Owl as we crossed the foreshore. A few friendly villagers helped us change a punctured tyre.

Despite the heat, our birding continues in the suburbs and rural areas. The locals are always interested in our mission and travels. Margaret Parrock

Branch Activities

Friends of the Vumba is a community initiative that employs 3 trained scouts to protect the wildlife – tracking for snares and arresting poachers of game, birds and wood. We also support an education outreach into the schools in the area, mostly focussed on birding but more recently extending into wider environmental issues such as WESSA's Water program, rubbish health awareness, alien tree harvesting and indigenous tree planting.

Directions to regular venues (Google Earth co-ordinates):

CABS Northridge Park -17.777494, 31.090782. From town drive along Borrowdale Road, turn right into Whitwell, next right into Ridgeway North, next right into Northend Road and first right into Northridge Close. Drive to the end of the road and go through a security boom into Northridge Park.

Marlborough Vlei -17.742715, 30.990416. Meet at the bottom of Princess Margaret Road, off Harare Drive and follow the road round to the left. Park on the short road midway along the bottom of Princess Margaret.

Mukuvisi Woodlands -17.851935, 31.092010. Turn off the Chiremba Road into Ford Road (opposite Queensdale shops) cross over Longford Avenue and bear left down to the T-junction on Blatherwick Road. Turn right and the gate is about 150 metres on the left. Bring a tip for the car guard. Don't forget refreshments for after the walk when we record the number of species. The **public car park** is off Hillside Road, -17.835393, 31.089111.

Prince Edward School car park -17.818721, 31.036462. Josiah Tongogara Ave.

Monavale Vlei -17.806770, 31.010579. From Quendon Road turn into Lyndhurst Road, at bottom follow right hand bend, take first left and second right to BS Leon roundabout. Second exit is Fenella Drive. Meet on Fenella Drive.

Haka Park -17.843391, 31.143369. From the traffic circle at the Mutare Road/Harare Drive intersection, continue 500m and turn left, follow the road (770m) to the Haka sign and boom on the left. If entering through the boom on Harare Drive (-17.828473, 31.140253; 1.9 km north of the circle) make your way to the meeting point. \$400 entrance fee for BLZ members, \$500 others.

Greystone Park -17.746184, 31.127215. From Rolf Avenue/Harare Drive traffic circle, turn east onto Gaydon Road. After 2 km turn right into Halford Road and preserve is 200 m on left.
