BLUE SWALLOW SURVEY, Nyanga National Park 9 - 10 November 1996

The status of the Blue Swallow in Zimbabwe is uncertain and in South Africa it is endangered. A rough estimate of 300 breeding pairs was made for Zimbabwe, with the montane grasslands in Nyanga National Park being the main breeding area. It is vital that an up-to-date population assessment be made this season. A full scale count in the Nyanga area in November is being organised and an appeal to every member and their birding friends to assist with this important project.

Teams will be organised to walk selected sections of the National Park and surrounding areas to count the swallows and hopefully locate nest sites. This is a large easily recognised species and relatively easy to locate. This will be a fun weekend and you will be participating in a very important project. Here is an opportunity to do something worthwhile towards the conservation of our birds. Let's have a good OAZ turnout. The meeting place for a full briefing will be in the hall next to Rhodes Nyanga Hotel. Please will members and friends in Mutare, Chimanimani and Chipinge count Blue Swallows in their areas over the same weekend. # Eastern Districts

DOROWA Minerals. Sunday 30th June 1998.

For this report we are indebted to 12 year old Emma Holland who delighted all of us with her unflagging interest and enthusiasm, identification skills, courtesy and charm. Editing was not necessary; "Spell-check" would have been superfluous. One bird was removed from the article. I think Emma on one occasion let herself be too easily influenced by a certain female friend. Thank you Emma, please join us again.

When we woke up at 6 a.m., it was a windless day and we felt good birding in the air. We were joined by Mrs Cecilia Manson from Bvumba, Abasi Jana from Aberfoyle and some local birders. On the way there a few of us were lucky enough to see a pair of Augur Buzzard perched on a leafless tree. First of all we went to meet our hosts at the club who were Mr Mafukidse, the present Manager and Mr and Mrs Bowker.

We had a good start with a Lesser Honeyguide, Long-billed Crombec, Goldentailed Woodpecker, Marico Sunbird and Common Scimitarbill. We hear the Grey-headed Bush-shrike and Brown-crowned Tchagra calling in some thickets. On the way to the dam we spotted a few Chestnut-vented Tit-babblers.

At the healthily vegetated dam we saw martins and swallows crowding the sky. Red-billed Teal and Hottentot Teal were seen. On the way to the slime pan we spotted a lone Dickinson's Kestrel on a telephone pole. At the slime pan we had a good sighting of a Greater Flamingo and watched a Kittlitz's Plover doing her clever act to protect her eggs. The pan also gave us herons, duck and a Black-chested Snake-eagle. At the river we identified Common Greenshank, plovers and wagtails with a brief sighting of a Giant Kingfisher. On the Bird Club's usual trip to the landing strip we sighted Red-capped Lark, Crowned Lapwing, Kittlitz's Plover, Capped Wheatear, Chestnut-backed Sparrowlark and Tawny Eagle. After a delicious lunch we spotted Groundscraper Thrush on the lawn. The EDBC would like to thank our hosts for their kind hospitality and the cooks for a wonderful lunch. **Emma Holland**.

OSBORNE DAM. Saturday 13th July 1996. Waterfowl Census Our objective this pleasant afternoon was to monitor the gradual build up of waterbird numbers on this beautiful piece of water. In the short term this may seem rather a pointless exercise but when the dam is well established, our figures will no doubt be useful evidence of how a new area of water is slowly colonised.

The numbers, along with those from Cynara are also sent to Slimbridge in the UK as our contribution to the African Waterfowl Census.

As our group of eight crossed the dam wall we were pleased to see that the water depth stood at a healthy 86.8m. The paths used by the local villagers had to be relocated once again as previous ones had disappeared under water. With such a vast area of water we only saw about 10% but this produced Egyptian Goose, White-breasted Cormorant and Reed Cormorant, Little Grebe and Pied Kingfisher. Waders were absent as there was no established shoreline but Rock Martin, Wire-tailed Swallow and Eastern Saw-wing were seen over the water.

In the msasas on the eastern shore we found Golden-breasted Bunting, canaries, Red-billed Quelea and waxbills but the sighting of the day was the Martial Eagles. **Ken Dixon**.

#### Matabeleland

St. James Mission 16th June 1996

This proved to be an interesting area with a variety of different habitats to explore. We began on the banks of the Gwaai, a river fringed by a few tall Acacia trees with lush undergrowth to investigate. Horus Swift wheeled overhead, and at ground level a pair of Orange-winged Pytilia held our interest. Non breeding whydahs caused confusion and a pink-legged Purple Widowfinch added to identification problems. A Grey Tit-flycatcher called and a Verreaux's Eagle-owl was disturbed from its slumbers. Red-billed Oxpeckers flew across the river - perhaps a range extension for this species?

After lunch a walk through mixed woodland yielded Swallow-tailed Bee-eaters and Little Bee-eater and Black-chested Prinia. White-backed Vultures and Lappet-faced Vultures and a variety of raptors were seen on what was a memorable day with interesting sightings. **M Smith** 

#### FORT RIXON DAM 14th July 1996

A small group of stalwarts participated in the July census - a count which was notable for what wasn't present. A shoreline count revealed little of note and the open shore produced a Three-banded Plover nest with two eggs, and the remains of a Yellow-billed Stork. A deserted fishing cottage now home to a Barn Owl and a termite mound occupied by an extremely large cobra which slithered back down its hole like a length of sucked spaghetti. Total of a little over 300 were mostly Egyptian Goose!

#### AISLEBY Waterfowl Count 21st July 1996

This proved the most interesting winter count to date. The influx of sewage into the Upper UMGUSA Dam at the beginning of the year produced a nutrient filled soup, ideal for a variety of ducks.

A considerable number of Little Grebes were present amongst which were four Black-necked Grebes. Feeding Pied Avocet and Black-winged Stilt were seen near the headwaters and the highlight of the morning was an out of range Long-toed Lapwing. 1200 Egyptian Goose caused plenty of confusion; however 14 Maccoa Duck were seen. All in all a total of 4000 birds with 42 species represented a worthwhile count. **M. Smith**  Glen Livet 24th - 28th May 1996 There was a turn out of 11 and 106 species were recorded. We stayed at Martin and Lynne Wilkins lovely cottage at Glen Livet. The shore is heavily wooded with miombo on steep hillsides. We walked up the mountain behind the cottage where we encountered several bird parties which included Greencapped Eremomela, Southern Hyliota and Retz's Helmet-shrike. Cut-throat Finches were still in the vicinity of a Red-headed Weaver's nest which they had probably used. The riverine vegetation in the Popateke Gorge had been flattened by the recent floods and little bird life was seen there. A walk upstream produced an out of season Klaas's Cuckoo, Yellow-bellied Greenbul and Orange-winged Pytilia. The highlight of the afternoon was sitting 3 meters away from a Malachite Kingfisher in Gavin Conway's boat - a spectacular sight. Friday night owl tapes were played to which the African Barred Owlet responded immediately and subsequently called all night. Unfortunately Sunday's tour to Great Zimbabwe by Keith Harvey to see the sunbirds was rained out. **B. Beekes** 

#### Princess Farm SHURUGWI 21st - 23rd June 1996

The weekend was cold, wet and windy with a turnout of 4 - 64 birds were recorded. Sunday at the sewage works Kevin Barry and I saw 20-30 Threebanded Plovers and 10 Black-winged Stilts including a number of juveniles. A solitary out-of-season White-throated Swallow was present with the resident Wire-tailed Swallows. The African Crowned Eagles nest we visited had been blown out of the tree and the pair had moved to a new site about 1 km away. The Mountain Acacia tree in which Southern Ground-hornbills had recently raised young was sadly rotten and likely to fall down. Happily the visit to the African Hawk-eagles nest proved to have two eggs in it and both eagles were in attendance. **B. Beekes**

 Edna Elliott-McColl saw 10 White Storks at CROWBOROUGH Sewage Works on 7th July 1996.
 Rob Drummond reports seeing two groups of Magpie Mannikins at EWANRIGG POTINIC CAPPENS on 14th July 1996. One group of two adults and 4 juveniles.

BOTANIC GARDENS on 14th July 1996. One group of two adults and 4 juveniles, and the other of 10 - mostly adult birds.

4. Dave Gray saw: a. 7th June 1996. 1 Black Stork near Beta School on the Marondera/Juru Road.

b. 10th July 1996. 4 White Storks in a wheat field on the Bindura/Shamva Road.

c. 10th July 1996. 1 Black Stork on nest with 2 chicks at Amm's Mine, Madziwa area.

d. 1st August 1996. 19 White Storks in wheat field on Harare/Karoi Road. Also 1 Yellow-billed Kite.

5. Sean Lues, Chikwenya Safari Camp, MANA Pools National Park:

a. 21st June 1998. Pair of Red-necked Falcons who spent some time between two trees — the main reason being a small bird the one had caught.

b. 24th June 1996. In a fairly large bird party there were a number of interesting birds, the most interesting being a female Black Cuckooshrike. c. 25th June 1996. Ross Partington observed a Redchested Cuckoo at close range. d. At various times small groups of Southern Carmine Bee-eaters have been seen fairly regularly.
